The communities of Hanalei, Wainiha and Hā'ena are located between the Hanalei Bridge and the end of the Kuhio Highway at Ke'e Beach in Hā'ena State Park.



These communities are not designated visitor destinations; they are quiet residential communities and sacred environments.



Access is limited by a narrow winding highway and seven one-lane bridges that experience sudden closures and damages from hazards.

DISASTERS DON'T TAKE VACATIONS

The communities of Hanalei to Hā'ena experience:

- Some hazards may occur at the same time and can be life-threatening, with as little as 18 minutes to escape to high ground from a nearshore tsunami.
- During heavy, unannounced rains, trail and road closures can happen quickly and severely, and can be deadly to cross.
- You may not have cell service, and could be unable to receive emergency alerts.
